Executive Director

The first full year of operation in our new building is behind us and what a year it has been. There were so many new features and processes to learn and everyone embraced these changes with excitement and



wonder. We had our first true test of the structural integrity of the building during Hurricane Fiona. Power was lost for three days but our new generator kicked in saving thousands of dollars in food inventory and once it resumed we were able to offer the use of the facilities to staff, clients, and the community. We also have a much more visible presence in the community which has led to many more opportunities for living and learning in an inclusive community; the essence of our building campaign. We were proud to showcase our centre throughout the year to all of our wonderful supporters through a variety of events and tours. All things considered, in a year marked by hurricanes, polar vortex, flooding, heat waves, and life after COVID, we are where we are today because of our dedicated and committed team of individuals.

With proposed changes to services and programs within the Disability Support Program, staff, board, and participants have been engaged throughout the year in various consultation processes and presentations to keep ourselves informed. While the uncertainty and the unknown can be stressful, the common thread amongst everyone is that change is good and necessary. Our goal this year will be to identify what needs to change within our organization, find ways to further engage participants, staff, board, and community members in the process, and ensure that choice, self-advocacy, and inclusion are at the forefront of all we do. As we move forward, we will keep advocating for change and will continue to work collaboratively with all of our partners to build upon and enhance community-based supports and increase opportunities for individuals with varying abilities.

At a time when everyone is so busy, your commitment to working together for the betterment of Horizon goes beyond measure.



OUR MISSION

Who We Are and What We Do

THE ORGANIZATION

Horizon Achievement Centre is a non-profit organization registered under the Society Act, Province of Nova Scotia. It is also a registered Charity under the Canada Income Tax Act. The operation is governed by a community-based Board of Directors made up of 14 volunteers each bringing their oownexperience to the organization. The Department of Community Services provides funding that supports a portion of the cost of services. The remaining costs are generated through the sale of products and services and fundraising activities. Department of Community Services also provides core funding to our Employment Development Program.

THE MANDATE

The mandate of the society is to promote and enhance the independence, choice, integration and full community inclusion of adults with mental/ intellectual disabilities or those facing multiple barriers to employment through individualized training, instruction, and employment opportunities.

THE GOALS

- To provide an adult learning environment that recognizes and builds on individual skills, strengths, and needs.
- To provide practical work activities that enhance learned skills, foster appropriate work habits, and assist in identifying or validating career choices.
- To provide educational, life, and personal skill development training to enhance individual achievement in life or work.
- To provide community-based experiences that reinforce learned skills and establish a mechanism for participants to showcase these skills.
- To address individual choices and needs through case planning and in partnership with other support services

Being located next to Open Hearth Park has given us added opportunities for inclusion by participating in community events such as Ribfest and the Heartland walk which were both held there.


In terms of our department contracts, we have maintained a steady workload and I must commend clients and staff for their continued efforts. With ticket sales, new print




Opportunity for Social Inclusion as clients participate in the Heartland walk.

Our shopping trips are always great! While out in the community we always see friends and get to work on money skills.



In Life Enhancement we do our part in diverting waste from the landfill. Participants take part in programming promoting the importance of recycling and its advantages. Along with our auction we process refundables donated by friends and family. The addition of the outside bin has increased the number of items dropped off to us, funding was secured through Divert Nova Scotia. In the past year we have processed 46, 880 in items.

We are proud of all of our accomplishments and commit to continued efforts to advance our community involvement and empower our participants. I applaud the amazing efforts of the staff and participants of the Life Enhancement Department and look forward to advancements to our program in the year to come.

COMMUNITY EMPLOYMENT

The Community Employment department is dedicated to helping participants achieve their employment goals and thrive in the workforce. Our services include career counselling, job search support, resume building, interview preparation, and workplace orientation.

Additionally, we offer valuable opportunities for volunteer work, on-the-job experience placements, paid employment, specialized training, and personalized job coaching. This year, over 40 individuals have successfully taken advantage of Community Employment opportunities, collaborating with numerous businesses and organizations.



Safe and Supportive Work Environments: Small group training provides opportunities for participants to enhance their skills and prepare for community employment opportunities.



Community: Volunteering provides opportunities for participants to widen their social networks, explore new industries, develop new interests and employment goals, while strengthening the ties between participants and their communities.

This year, participants donated 1,888 hours of their time to volunteer in their community. Volunteer placements unite participants with their communities and provide a platform to share their expertise and learn new skills, all while supporting diverse organizations and creating a meaningful impact. Volunteering also opens doors to broader social networks, exposes individuals to various industries, and sparks newfound passions that may pave the way to exciting employment opportunities.

The Horizon Achievement Centre offers various work experience placements designed to empower participants with relevant on-the-job skills and industry experience. Each placement comprises 160 working hours, during which individuals acquire valuable insights and hands-on knowledge. By participating in various employment tasks, participants gain comprehensive knowledge of the industry, showcase their strengths and abilities, and develop skills that aid them in making well-informed decisions about their career goals and future employment paths. This year, participants collectively logged a total of 2,940 work experience hours.



Training: Work experience placements provide opportunities for participants to gain relevant, on-the-job experience and essential employment skills, while also enabling them to demonstrate their strengths and abilities, gain skills that assist them in making better-informed decisions regarding their employment goals, and in making better-informed decisions regarding their future employment choices.



Inclusion: When participants achieve quality, meaningful and gainful employment, this provides stable income and opportunities for social participation and inclusion. Paid employment gives participants a sense of purpose, self-worth, and achievement as they reach their employment goals and contribute to their workplace and their community as a whole.

This year, participants had 11,678 hours of paid employment. The significance of this achievement lies in the stability it provides through a steady income and increased opportunities for social engagement and inclusion. With paid employment, individuals experience a sense of purpose, self-esteem, and fulfillment as they successfully reach their employment goals and contribute positively to their workplaces and the community at large.

EMPLOYMENT DEVELOPMENT CENTRE

The mandate of the Employment
Development Centre is to assist
employment-disadvantaged individuals to
overcome attitudinal, social and educational
barriers to employment by providing
individualized skills and employment
services, thereby enhancing and increasing
their potential within the community.

It has been a very busy year for the Employment Development Centre. We have had a number of staff changes over the last 8 months. These exciting changes have included Michelle Trenholm, the previous Assessment Facilitator becoming the Manager and Michelle Piovesan, the previous Employer Facing Facilitator moving to the Assessment Facilitators position. We have also welcomed Shefat Akter as the Administrative Assistant and Nicole MacAskill as the new Labour Market Liason and Facilitator.



During the last eight months, we invited community agencies to tour our facility, as well as, employees going into the community to promote the new programming structure of the Employment Development Centre. We have been to see caseworkers with the Department of Community Services and Nova Scotia Works, as well as, many Community Based Organizations, such as, Crossroads and Pathways to Employment.





During 2021-2022, the Employment
Development Centre Program was broken
into 3 sections of delivery, the 4 week
assessment, 12 weeks of Marketable
Skills, and 10 weeks of Work Placement.
During 2022-2023 we are really starting to
see the benefits of this section of the
program.

The Assessment has allowed us to focus on the best direction a new client should take. The client now has more input and control of the path that works best for them with staff input, guidance from the Assessment Facilitator and their caseworkers for advancing their employment goals whether they continue onto a different organization, marketable skills, or work placement.

The Marketable Skills section has remained the same, focusing on skills in Maintenance/ Environmental Services, Retail/Customer Service and Food Service. The Work Placement section has increased from a 4 week placement to a 10 week work placement. The additional time has given clients more time to adjust and demonstrate their skills which has resulted in more placements turning into employment.



The many changes over the last 18 months have been challenging but the staff of the Employment Development Centre have been working hard to continuously evolve the program to be the best it can be for the clients we serve and make them as successful as they can be in whatever path they choose.


